LAKE POINT PROJECT RUNS A STEADY STRIDE FORWARD

Visited the Lake Point Project near Lake Okeechobee on Saturday with Brad Scherer. From our last visit in May which marked the ground-breaking on the site, a lot of dirt has been moved around

and already some finishing touches have been added to the project, i.e. the four polo fields (two back to back) that are at the center of this 1,000 acres phase I, plus a beautiful 100-foot wide track that goes a

big mile around field 3 & 4. The ground work is close to being finished, the next step that includes the roads, utilities, fences and new vegetation as well as a horse that will run miles and miles throughout the 1,000 acre will take this next 12 months-plus for a delivery to the new 42 site owners hopefully by next Christmas 2007.

horses and riders with miles of trails running through the 1,000 acre site, a 3 mile gallop is currently being built on the other side of the canal that runs alongside of the 25,000 acres Dupuis Preserve.

42 owners will be sharing the use of the 1,000 acre property (phase I) and the 4 polo fields.
